Principles of Radiation protection

The current radiation protection are based on three general principles, which are recommended by ICRP(international commission for Radiological protection)

- JUSTIFICATION: No practice shall be adopted unless it's introduction produces a net positive 1. benefits
- **OPTIMISATION:** All exposers shall be kept as low as reasonably achievable (ALARA), economic 2. and social factors being taken into account
- 3. DOSE LIMITATION: The dose equivalent to individual shall not exceed the limits recommended for the appropriate circumstances.
 - Justifiable use- A practice that entails exposer to radiation should only be adopted, if it yields sufficient benefit to the exposed individuals or to society, to outweigh the radiation detriment it causes or could cause. This involves the correct assessment of the clinical indication for the requested examination, knowledge of the expected yield from the examination and the way in which the results are expected to influence the diagnosis and subsequent medical management of the patient.
 - Optimisation and ALARA- Radiation sources and installations should be provided with the best available protection and safety measures under the prevailing circumstances, so that the magnitudes and likelyhood of exposures and numbers of individuals exposed be kept as low as reasonably achievable (ALARA).
 - Dose limitations- There is no absolute evidence of a threshold below which no damage occurs. Even the lowest the lowest doses may cause damage to the cells which might later lead to malignancy or hereditary effects if the cells irradiated are germ cells in Gonads. Therefore, we have to assume that the probability of radiation induced cancer or serius hereditary defects are proportional to radiation dose right down to the lowest levels .Individual doses due to the combination of exposures from all relevant practices should not exceed specified dose limits for occupational and public exposure.
